

The **OFFICE OF STUDENT AFFAIRS (OSA)** is on its tract in pursuit of its Vision to become an excellent service provider producing empowered UPLB students with its mission to provide an environment conducive and supportive of the students' academic and personality growth and development.

Guided by the **SMARTER** agenda that was immediately set in 2012, with the leadership of Dr. Leticia E. Afuang, this office has worked progressively for the achievement of its goals as follows:

STAFF DEVELOPMENT: Support at least one PhD and one MS student from among the OSA staff and conduct regular monthly in-house training/equipping of OSA personnel.

MULTIPLICATION OF COUNSELLORS: Train and deploy life coaches from among UPLB faculty, staff and senior students.

AUTOMATION OF STUDENT SERVICES: Provide quick and accurate automated information and services to UPLB students.

RESOLUTION OF STUDENT CONFLICTS AND PROBLEMS: Swift resolution of all existing cases related to student conduct or student organizations and year-round implementation of preventive measures against conflicts between student groups.

TRANSFORMATION INITIATIVE: Mobilization of students and student organizations for collaborative activities to create community transformation

ENHANCEMENT OF STUDENT WELL BEING: Creation of the OSA System for holistic student growth and development

RAISING FINANCIAL SUPPORT AND CAPABILITY: Increase the current number of scholarship slots and donors. Train staff and students in financial literacy management and freedom. Improve loan repayment.

We praise God and thank all personnel as we see that OSA has achieved an average of 85% of all its set target from 2012 to 2015 (see Appendix II - Gantt Chart). After having initiated several

improvements of the office procedures in 2012, OSA has continuously developed and provided holistic programs and services, stimulating different aspects of human life so that each student develops into a well-rounded, fully equipped and dedicated "Iskolar ng Bayan" and "Iskolar Para sa Bayan"; each one eventually becoming a committed leader of his/her respective profession.

OSA developed efficient and effective delivery of student services thru its ongoing modernization called the "Office of Student Affairs Management (OSAM) System". Emergency communications, individual messages and general information announcements have become OSA's regular function, both at the in-house and University level. A computer information desk has served students for many of their inquiries and clarifications especially during registrations and permit applications. Student's questions are answered without them coming to the office for inquiry.

Linkaging, networking and database management through its newly generated Communications and Information Technology (COMMIT) unit, are also added functions of OSA. It mediates between various parties with utmost concern for student welfare. Its current thrust is to take a pro-active stance in rendering services to the students and all concerned sectors of the University.

OSA constitutes three divisions, one service unit, one program, and a tribunal, supported by the Director's Office (DO), as follows:

- Counseling and Testing Division (CTD)
- Scholarships and Financial Assistance Division (SFAD)
- Student Organizations and Activities Division (SOAD)
- International Students Services (ISS)
- Learning Resource Program (LRP)
- Student Disciplinary Tribunal (SDT)

The **Director's Office** supported the OSA through staff and student development. In-house trainings and personnel development include the Financial Literacy which is a series of lectures and trainings initially conducted in June 2013, and will continue with the availability of time and resource persons. The Computer Literacy including the report preparation workshop is also a series of equipping for staff in need of specific computer software skills. Protips is a bi-monthly lunch together of NGWs and newly hired staff for professional tips and encouragement. The Monthly Booster of OSA personnel is a venue for wellness, sharing of experiences, inspiration and enrichment of one another thereby promoting camaraderie and unity toward a proactive outlook in life. OSA staffs were also exposed to professional involvement like the Philippine Association for Administrators of Student Affairs (PAASA). Graduate studies are encouraged, with two (2) staff taking masteral courses.

Two (2) administrative officers assigned as cashiers during the registration, served 1,586 students amounting to Php6,009,491.00 during the 1st semester AY2013-2014 and 3,111 students amounting to Php15,859,832.10 for 2nd semester AY2013-2014. The one- stop-clearance has also lightened the clearance burden for students. A more systematic procedure for financial application procedures including public monitor announcement has ensured systematic and fast service. The OSA second floor lobby, although waiting for renovation has also improved with plants, more seats and lobby monitor for announcements and inspirational video shows. It is also used for rehearsal, practice, and meetings of recognized groups e.g. Chorale Ensemble, Harmonya, USC. We accommodated also the HEED Foundation to use our conference room for their value formation meetings of their scholars.

A series of meetings and consultations conducted with Business Affairs Office (BAO) personnel, Architect Rañola of Campus Planning and Development Office (CPDO) and OSA personnel resulted to a revised SU Upper floor renovation budget plan. To date, the final approval of the financial requirement is for the Chancellor's consideration.

The **Counseling and Testing Division (CTD)** has continuously played an active role for student development through its psychosocial programs and services like counseling, group guidance, psychological testing, readmission, career information and placement, orientation, tutorial and referral services. Around 11,718 students had availed the various services of CTD.

The proposed Faculty-Student Relations Officers (FSRO) for Effective Student Management and Mentoring was approved on October 2012. CTD Guidance Services Specialists trained 92 faculty, 1 researcher and 2 administrative personnel on identification of students at risks and interventions, and enhancement of their skills in advising and mentoring for the FSRO program. Each college now has a set of FSRO in charge of their student case identification and intervention in close monitoring and communication with each of the assigned GSS.

CTD conducted five (5) trainings on Life Coaching Seminar Workshop for the OSA staff, student housing personnel, student volunteers and parents, equipping their facilitating skills so they can be sensitive enough for individuals at risks.

The **Scholarship and Financial Assistance Division (SFAD)** continuously carried out its commitment in providing financial support to economically deprived UPLB students. SFAD, offering Socialized Tuition and Financial Assistance Program (STFAP), Student Assistantship, Loan Programs and Scholarships unloaded many students of their financial problems. Through the development of advance automated technology, application procedures became shorter and faster.

SFAD has taken a big leap in rendering services to UPLB students and increased the number of students availing its services.

A total of 5,166 students benefited from STFAP for 1^{st} Semester 2013-2014 and 4,739 on the 2^{nd} Semester 2012-2013. A total amount of Php424,800.00, Php268,000.00 and Php1,363,200.00 were given to STFAP beneficiaries from 2^{nd} Semester 2012-2013, Summer 2013 and 1^{st} Semester 2013-2014, respectively. A total of Php4,809,362.45 was refunded to students with positive results in their STFAP appeal.

For Student Assistantship, 2,134 students received salary amounting to Php9,592,240.50 from November 2012 to October 2013. Seventy six received benefits as Student University Performer-Student Assistants (SUP-SA).

For government and private scholarships, 23 scholarships were administered by UPLB and 18 from UP Diliman. Five (5) new scholarships were added to existing list of scholarship programs effective 2nd semester 2013 – 2014. These are BASF Agricultural Research Foundation, Inc., Sugar Regulatory Administration (SRA), Nescafe Coffee University of the Philippines (Nescafe CUPS), Fostering Education and Environment for Development Inc. (FEED) and Philchema. There were 214 recipients during the 2nd Semester 2012-2013 and 174 grantees on the 1st semester 2013-14. A total of Php1,788,128.50 for 2nd Semester 2012-2013 and Php1,544,895.00 for 1st Semester 2013-2014 were released for the UPLB administered scholars.

There are 15 available loan programs including the Student Loan Board (SLB), 13 Cash Loan programs and the recently implemented Meal-Now-Pay-Later (MNPL) emergency loan effective 2nd Semester 2013-2014. A total of 3,955 students amounting to Php43,953,616.87 availed the loan programs during the 2nd Semester 2012-2013, 19 students (Php56,000) during the Summer 2013, and 4,903 students (Php65,000,513) on the 1st Semester 2013-2014.

The **Student Organizations and Activities Division** Students' Hard-Earned Rewards System (SOAD-SHARES) program proposal started implementation on June 2013 as per Office of the Chancellor Memorandum No. 177. To motivate recognized student organizations of the University to conduct and participate in activities especially for extension/community service projects, they are given points which can be exchanged for "rewards". One of these is the FREE or discounted use of University facilities.

SOAD accredited a total of 161 organizations during the 1st Semester 2013-2014 with the following breakdown: Academic (73), Cultural (15), Fraternity (11), Political (3), Religious (7), Socio-Civil (23), Sorority (10), Sports and Recreational (3), and Varsitarian (16).

SOAD continuously promotes reduced paper usage ("paperless") in the office thru the creation of an online information system ("OrgsUP'), automation and digitization of forms among others. This is in support to environmental conservation and had saved 50,215 sheets of paper as of November 29, 2013.

In support to the University's goal of internationalization, the **International Student Services (ISS)** has served a total of 180 international students during the 2nd Semester 2012-2013, 56 during Summer of 2013, 215 for the 1st Semester 2013-2014 and 211 for the 2nd Semester 2013-2014, pursuing Bachelor, Masters or Doctoral degree. ISS are very supportive in their needs and have actively participated in all the activities and programs for the international students such as Sports Festival, Food Festival, and Cultural Night among others. And for the first time, ISS has conducted the investiture and commissioning of sixteen (16) UPLB international students of graduating class 2013 as UPLB Ambassadors of Goodwill. The 1st batch of Ambassadors is from Cambodia, Korea, Laos, Indonesia, Myanmar and Vietnam.

ISS envision itself as an interactive promoter of the University's prestige in the academic community. ISS maintain good relationship with the international community by building friendship and camaraderie, and by winning their trust and confidence.

The **Learning Resource Program (LRP)** implemented the Instructional Assistance and Enrichment Program, including the Summer Bridge Program (SBP) and tutorials. They assisted 88 students in their academic and psycho-social adjustment in the University thru the SBP.

It also managed the Agricultural and Rural Development Scholarship (ARDS) Program where there are twenty-five (25) Agricultural and Rural Development Scholars (ARDS). During the 1st Semester 2013-2014, one (1) scholar graduated, one (1) was a university scholar, two (2) were college scholars and 5 in the honor roll. Nine (9) new scholars were accepted in the 2nd Semester 2013-2014.

This year 75% of the new and pending cases were resolved by the Tribunal and only 25% or 8 active cases remain in the **Student Disciplinary Tribunal (SDT)** docket. Two hundred twenty

(220) members of the student organizations attended the Tribunal's seminar on Human Right violations in relation to the provisions of the RA 8049, the Anti-Hazing Law.

Students' victims from the Central part of the Visayas Region especially from the aftermath of "Yolanda" typhoon's calamities and Bohol's earthquake were assisted by OSA in coordination with the Office of the Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs (OVCAA). Sixty-six UPLB undergraduate and 28 graduate students were identified and were provided financial assistance thru the STFAP and additional financial support and meal stubs from concerned donors. From Syngenta, some students are also given long term scholarship support. CTD-OSA also has conducted a psycho-social program and 14 students are continuously attending counseling.

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DIRECTOR'S OFFICE

The main thrust of the Director's office is to provide support services to all divisions/units and offices of OSA for efficient implementation of programs and activities; and for efficient delivery of students' needs. For staff development, OSA staff are encouraged to pursue higher education and are equipped by conducting regular monthly in-house training and endorsing them to attend trainings, seminars and workshops related to their functions, thereby enhancing their skills and knowledge. The office was able to serve the students for their university clearance, certificate of good moral character and other needs (Table 1).

Creation of the Communications and Information Technology (COMMIT)

COMMIT is the team that brought the OSA Management (OSAM) System into life. The team has one information technology and communications officer (additional assignment of University Extension Specialist) and two software developers (Project Development Associates).

Over 50,000 Minutes Saved in Processing Of SLB Forms

About 4,000 UPLB students used the automated SLB system during the first and second semester of AY 2013-2014. With this system, it took only about two minutes to process a loan application whereas it took about ten minutes to process the application manually. This service upgrade resulted to shorter and faster queues at OSA.

The automated SLB system was developed in-house under the Communications and Information Technology (COMMIT) unit. The system has not only remained costless but has also helped minimize overall expenses through paperless practices, distributed encoding, and increased work efficiency.

The system, nationally known as LINK APP: Linked Independent Kiosks for Application Processing, was presented in the National Conference on Information Technology Education (NCITE) in October 25, 2013 and has won the Best Paper Award for Information Systems.

Being branded as "offline is okay," LINK APP processes loan applications even if power is unstable or Internet connection is intermittent. The award-winning system will continue to serve UPLB students in the succeeding semesters with its architecture gradually being implemented to other OSA systems.

LINK APP ABSTRACT:

LINK APP is a web application that uses HTML 5 and JavaScript to access and record loan application details in a centralized server through a local database. The local database uses localStorage and WebSQL to store data. To protect the data stored in the LINK APP database, RSA and AES encryption were used to store and transmit data.

The end users use the website of the office to generate applications forms that contain a QR Code. LINK APP is used by the staff members of the office to process the loan application forms. A downcast webcam is used to read the data.

LINK APP supports offline usage so the application works even if Internet connection is intermittent. The University saves about 5,000 sheets of paper every semester because of LINK APP.

Scholarships Portal Launched

Financial aid is provided to scholars to encourage them to continue studying. OSA has about 39 scholarships aside from regular financial assistance provided to students like SLB, STFAP, SA, and SUPSA. The 39 scholarships are from private and government institutions. Each of these scholarships has its own requirements and benefits. The benefits include monthly or semestral stipends, reduced or free matriculation fees, and other forms of allowances.

While OSA encourages students to always aim to get 1.0 grades, OSA understands that most students have to go the extra mile to get high grades. Thus, OSA has worked hard to convince donors that a lot of UP students who did not graduate with very high grades were successful after graduation. Thus, OSA has scholarships not only to students running for honors.

Starting December 2014, the Scholarships and Financial Assistance Division will regularly update the List of Available Scholarships at www.osam.tk/aid.

Student Assistantship (SA) Automation

In November 2012, the UPLB Office of Student Affairs automated the daily time records of student assistants who work during regular hours (8 a.m. to 5 p.m.). This has significantly reduced errors in the preparation of payroll. The processing of the DTRs took only a day whereas manual processing would require three weeks.

In October 2013, OSA automated the SA requests for Second Semester AY 2013-2014. Some offices had a hard time adapting to the new process but the minor change is a vital step in OSA's desire to fully modernize its operations. One of the benefits of this move is the online publication of vacant SA positions at uplbosa.org/jobs.

In December 2013, the Communications and Information Technology (COMMIT) unit launched the new DTR system that caters to all student assistants, including those that work outside regular office hours. Thus, all student assistants under the Student Assistantship program are using the automated DTR. The recent partnership with Landbank allowed the student assistants to receive their salaries faster as the Cashier's Office will just transfer the funds to their personal bank accounts.

STFAP Appointment System Minimized Lengthy Queues at OSA

In February 2013, OSA implemented the STFAP Appointment System to assure applicants that they will be accommodated when they come. This means students and parents no longer need to line up as early as 4 a.m. just to ensure they will meet the day's application quota.

Setting of appointments is done online through the OSAM System at www.uplbosa.org. Students just need to login and select desired appointment schedule.

During their appointment date, students can come a few minutes before their scheduled appointment. They will be called through the AVP system that displays reminders, announcements, and the appointment queue.

With OSA's desire to hasten the processing of applications, more staff interviewers were deployed resulting to more applications being processed in a day.

One Stop Clearance System Simplified University Clearance Process

Initially conceptualized by Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs Oscar B. Zamora, the One Stop Clearance System was implemented in April 2013 to facilitate the clearing process of students. Before the system, students have to go to the University Housing Office, Main Library, and University Health Service. With the centralization of clearance database, students just need to get their clearance form from www.uplbosa.org and have it signed at the Director's Office of OSA.

The clearance form has a machine-readable label. This label is scanned in the OSAM System to determine if the student has any deficiency. The clearance database is updated periodically and students will also see their deficiencies online.

COUNSELING AND TESTING DIVISION

CTD continuously played an active role for student development through its psychosocial programs and services that help individuals become socially well-adjusted effective and happy persons. Below is a condensed report clientele served per service category:

Implementation of the FACULTY-STUDENT RELATIONS SEMINAR WORKSHOP (FSRO) LEVEL I last November 12, 2012 with 39 participants from the different colleges. Faculty members are frequently approached by students not only on their academic & non-academic concerns but also family issues of students. Likewise, as student personnel workers of OSA, they too are confronted with various student issues & problems other than the basic needs they have sought assistance in the specific unit as they act as "sounding boards of their clients". The same is true with our student volunteers and parents. Thus, life-coaching seminar workshops were conducted on the following dates as reflected below:

- Faculty Student Relations Seminar Workshops (FSRO) Level I at the Makiling Ballroom, November 12, 2012 with 39 attendees.
- Enhanced FSRO at Club Sol Y Viento last June 17, 2013 by UPLB Task Force & as facilitated by GSS with 65 faculty and 3 administrative staff participated from all the Colleges.
- Life Coaching Seminar Workshops for Student Volunteers, March 15-16, 2013 at the Makiling Ballroom with 60 attendees.
- Life Coaching Seminar Workshop for Student Housing Personnel conducted last December 4 & 6, 2013 for 2 batches with a total of 23 participants.
- Student at Risks: Signs & Symptoms and Suicide Awareness were also conducted in the Parents' Orientation during the first semester SY 2013-2014 with 28 attendees and during the second semester with 32 parents' participants last October 14-16, 2013 at Makiling Ballroom.

Significant meetings and consultations were done among offices to clarify some issues especially issues on confidentiality, right to privilege communication in the practice of guidance & counseling. brainstorming on the protocols on suicide cases and crisis team

involved etc. Collaborative efforts among offices were done with OVCAA, UHS, UPF, OASH & GC demonstrating ethics involved in the profession, thereby adhering to one's obligation on confidentiality of students' sensitive information & the role of each unit as a crisis team.

For Professional Advancement 3 Guidance Services Specialists (GSS) namely, Dr. Erick Vernon Dy, Mr. Gonzalo Amante Jr., Ms. Ordina Carlos attended the PGCA Midyear Workshop in Puerto Princesa, Palawan City last October 18-19, 2013 with the theme on "Towards Globally Competitive Counselors". This is to comply with the regular requirements for the renewal of license of GSS, as 60 CPE units of continuing professional education.

Ms. Zenaida Loberiza, Ms. Janett Dolor and Ms. Marites Mojica attended the "Go Negosyo: an Entrepreneurship Program" at SMX last November 19, 2013 as members of the Financial Literacy Committee of OSA.

As part of the GSS extension service, they served as resource persons & facilitators upon invitation. Some also served as facilitators or speakers as part of their mandate being members or officials of the UPLB CDC, UPSA, and REPS. A total of 83 extension services were rendered for this year.

"Off the Street On to School" Children's Outreach & Livelihood Program for their Parents last December 11, 2013 at Makiling Ballroom Hall. There were more or less 300 children and 50 parents who participated in the "Tulong Dunong" activities and fashion jewelry designing using beads as livelihood for parents.

In response to the direct & indirect UPLB Students victims of typhoon Yolanda, CTD designed a program called" CTD's Makulay-Tuloy-tuloy ang Buhay" with creative coping mechanism as its feature like progressive relaxation technique, dance & music therapy, art therapy, taichi and laughter yoga which was attended by 10 UPLB Students last Dec. 9, 2013. Likewise, donations in kind from GABAY-CTD & KAIROS Band were delivered to GMA 7 last Nov. 30, 2013.

The "CTD Statistical Report" on the series of program extension services and seminar workshops attended and facilitated by GSS as resource persons throughout November 2012 to December 2013.

SCHOLARSHIPS & FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE DIVISION

Through the years, the Scholarships and Financial Assistance Division (SFAD) carries out its mandate of providing financial aid packages for the economically disadvantaged and academically deserving students of UPLB. The sources of financial assistance available to students are the Socialized Tuition and Financial Assistance Program (STFAP) for the "Iskolar ng Bayan", private and government scholarships, student loans and the student assistantship program. Many of our students are completely supported by a combination of these financial aids. SFAD has taken a big leap towards automation of service processes in order to improve the delivery of services to UPLB students.

For the year 2013, innovative approaches to face the challenges of times were developed and its implementation has caused a positive impact towards the improvement of services delivered by SFAD to UPLB students. Initially, the Office of Student Affairs Management (OSAM) system developed by OSA's systems and program designer introduced the Student Assistance DTR automation in November 2012. Then the appointment system for the submission of STFAP application in February 2013, followed by automated SLB application process in June 2013. The downloadable forms of each of the financial assistance programs followed suit.

As a clear indication of increased efficiency in the delivery of its services, STFAP has exceeded the number of clients served during the prior year (2012) compared to the present year. The system limited the manual inputting of SA DTRs and SLB applications due to its automation. Application forms which are all available in any online site can be viewed and printed by students using the OSAM system. Positive feedbacks from many student clients were received by the division.

Socialized Tuition and Financial Assistance Program (STFAP)

All UP students receive state subsidies even when they pay the regular Bracket A or B UP tuition rates as it is not sufficient to defray the actual costs incurred by the university in providing quality education. However, students who need further subsidies are encouraged to apply under the Socialized Tuition and Financial Assistance Program (STFAP), a program to democratize admission of financially needy students to the various courses of the university. This grant is good for one year and renewable annually.

STFAP applicants are given bracket assignments based on their declared family income and socio-economic indicators (Table 1).

Table2 summarizes the number of STFAP recipients of AY 2nd Semester 2012-2013 and 1st Semester 2013-2014. The number of grantees increased by 9% or 427 students from 2nd Semester 2012-13 to 1st Semester 2013-14. There was a remarkable increase in the number of students served and application forms received with the implementation of the STFAP appointment system starting from the application period from February to June 2013 for School Year 2013-14.

Total amounts of Php692,800.00 during SY 2^{nd} semester 2012-2013 and Php1,363,200 1^{st} Semester of 2013-2014 were given to STFAP beneficiaries under the alphabetical bracketing scheme.

STFAP Appeals

Appeals for lowering of STFAP Bracket, filed by grantees and deliberated/acted upon by the UPLB Committee on Scholarships and Financial Assistance (UPLB-CSFA) based on standard guidelines set, totaled 679 (Table 3). Among them, only 121 recipients qualified for E2, 213 to E1 and 345 for other brackets.

Home Visitation

STFAP conducts home visits to applicants to verify the validity or veracity of information supplied in the application form, as a further requirement before appeals are being acted upon by the UPLB-CSFA. Bracket B Certification

As a standard policy and for the smooth implementation of the STFAP, all students of Batches 2011, 2012 and 2013 were required to submit documents as basis for Bracket B certification. They all need to submit proof for their annual household income of P1 Million or below. Students who belong to families with annual household income above P1Million and those who failed to submit the required documents to confirm their bracket shall automatically be assigned to Bracket A.

STUDENT ASSISTANTSHIP PROGRAM (SA)

The student assistantship program is aligned with the STFAP with the objective to support the educational needs of the students and to help and prepare the students on the acquisition of both a working experience and a development of their personality through association with the supervisors and other co-workers. Students are given the option to choose their type of work, specifically for jobs that are related to their course work.

Online generation of SA Daily Time Record (DTR) was introduced in November 2012 to those whose schedule occurs during the regular office working hours. Those with special work schedules beyond 5pm or over the weekends were able to avail online DTR generation starting 2nd Semester 2013-2014. It has improved the processing of SA payrolls such that cross-checking of class schedules and DTRs are no longer done manually.

Likewise, the Special University Performers-Student Assistant (SUP-SA) was implemented effective 1st Semester 2013-2014. This is in recognition of performer's rehearsal and contribution especially during special university events to members of Harmonya, UPLB Choral Ensemble and varsity members.

PRIVATE AND GOVERNMENT SCHOLARSHIPS (PGS)

These programs provide support to recipients without any obligation other than to enroll for regular semestral units and maintain satisfactory academic progress, fulfilling their responsibilities as students. There are sixty three scholarship grants and 388 recipients that are either UP Los Baños or UP Diliman administered (Table 9). Slots and benefits available to students are determined by the appropriation of donors.

In addition to the currently administered scholarship programs, five (5) new scholarship programs were implemented effective SY 1st Semester 2013-2014, namely:

- 1. BASF Agricultural Research Foundation, Inc.
- 2. Sugar Regulatory Administration (SRA)
- 3. Nescafe Coffee University of the Philippines (NESCAFE CUPS)
- 4. Fostering Education and Environment for Development Inc., (FEED)
- 5. Philchema

BASF, FEED and SRA are co-administered by SFAD and UPLB Foundation Inc. SFAD handles the academic program monitoring while the scholarship fund is managed by the UPLB Foundation, Inc.

Interviews were conducted by the UPLB-CSFA, college scholarship committees and other special committees to fill-up slots for the new programs and vacant slots of graduated recipients (Table 10).

For UP Diliman Administered scholarships, there was a total of sixty five (65) application forms for both the UP Presidential undergraduate/graduate slots and the Scholarship Program for Foreign Students(SPFS). Effective School Year 2013-2014, the twenty-one slots allotted to UPLB were 16 slots for UP Presidential undergraduates, 1 slot for MS, 1 slot for Ph.D. and 3 for the SPFS.

STUDENT LOANS

Students may avail loans for tuition and other education-related purposes through emergency cash loan programs wherein payment are made within prescribed time with minimal rate of interest.

The Student Loan Board offers tuition loan for a maximum loanable amount of 80% of assessed fees every semester. For emergency loans, thirteen (13) programs are currently operative for bridge financing which offers loans ranging from P1,000.00 to P5,000.00 per student per semester.

During the 1st Semester 2013-2014, system-based application for SLB was introduced. The main objective of the new scheme is to avoid long queues that a student/applicant is experiencing just to apply for a loan. The application process is shortened, wherein the form is filled-up online. Once accomplished, students will bring the printed form to the SFAD office with requirements and the loan will be immediately processed in just a few minutes.

The Meal-Now Pay Later (MNPL) program was implemented during the 2nd Semester 2013-2014 providing meals thru loan to qualified UPLB students who are experiencing financial difficulties. The two meal providers are Gered Diners and Tita Tess Fud Counter. Students availing this program are provided with food stubs worth Php100.00 per day maximum up to Php3,000.00 meal consumption per month exclusive of weekends and valid from the start until the last day of regular classes. The loan shall be paid thru an automatic deduction from student's monthly remuneration from scholarships, STFAP stipends or salaries for being student assistant.

Table13 shows a total of 3,965 borrowers for 2nd Semester 2012-13, 19 for summer 2013 and 4,903 for 1st Semester 2013-14.

SCHOLARSHIPS & FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE DIVISION

Student Organizations' Rewards Program is a Go

Chancellor Rex Victor O. Cruz approved the SOAD Students' Hard-Earned Rewards System (SHARES) as per OC Memorandum No. 177.

SOAD SHARES is a rewards program that aims to motivate student organizations by giving them points for certain activities they conduct or participate in. The points can be exchanged for "rewards" from the rewards catalog subject to availability. One of the rewards in the catalog is the free or discounted use of university facilities.

Venue administrators will treat redeemed SOAD SHARES points as cash payments. Redeemed points may be used in accordance with the guidelines attached to the memorandum.

The following are some highlights from the SOAD SHARES guidelines:

- 1. Only recognized student organizations are part of the program.
- 2. SOAD SHARES points may be shared with other student organizations once. When an organization shares its earned points, the sharing organization will be rewarded 20% of the shared points. The rebate points may not be shared anymore.
- 3. Points earned are not convertible to cash and may not be used as payment to people such as technicians and utility workers.
- 4. Points in an academic year will expire on the day after the last day of holding of activities in the following semester. Sharing of points will not extend the validity of points.
- 5. Based on the memorandum, organizations that participated in the Loyalty Day Parade will earn 500 points. For each University Scholar of the organization as of First Semester, the organization will earn 400 points. A student organization member who graduates as a Summa Cum Laude will leave 2000 points to his/her organization. The complete list of activities/accomplishments and corresponding points is in the SOAD SHARES Guidelines attached to OC Memorandum No. 177.

SOAD SHARES is retroactively applicable to all organization activities starting June 2013. However, SOAD is still updating OrgsUP to support the rewards system. Point persons and heads of student organizations will receive an SMS as soon as they can start redeeming rewards from the points they collected. In the meantime, the organizations are continually earning points as indicated in the guidelines.

Organizations data summary for 1st semester 2013 – 2014 are represented as follows: Table 1 shows 161 total recognized organizations, 891 total activities in Table 2, 317 student organization advisers in Table 3 and distributional data for college based organizations in Table 4.

Paperless Initiatives

Due to the paperless initiatives of SOAD, the office was able to save about 50,215 sheets of paper as of November 29, 2013. These initiatives include:

- 1. creation of an online information system ("OrgsUP") to facilitate records management;

- 3. online submission of activity reports
- 4. activity permits / advisers' consent form
- 5. encoding of student numbers during the registration period instead of submission of photocopy of Form 5s

INTERNATIONAL STUDENT SERVICES

The **International Student Services (ISS)** has been the center of information, activities and services of the international students in the University. It makes every effort to have a good relationship with the members of the international community.

ISS renders the following services:

- Issuance of study permits
- Provide basic certifications related to visa renewal or extension
- Conduct orientation (for new/incoming undergraduate foreign students)
- Advising, counseling, guidance instruction (in cooperation with the Counseling and Testing Division)
- Recommend better options for lodging or housing accommodation
- Offer tutorial services for free, in cooperation with UP GABAY volunteers and UPLB Scholars
- Provide necessary information about UPLB and the different services of the University, and the Philippines
- Act as intermediary between international students, faculty and administrators
- Promote socio-cultural and educational activities
- Psychosocial activities

A total of **180** international students were issued study permits during the 2nd Semester 2012-2013, **56** during Summer of 2013, **215** for the 1st Semester 2013-2014 and **211** for the 2nd Semester 2013-2014 pursuing Bachelor/Masters/Doctoral degree. International students coming from Africa, Australia, Europe, Middle East and mostly, from Asian countries. Summary of which are hereto attached.

This year, as per Memo No. 53 from the Chancellor dated March 21, 2013, the collection of Php500.00 as processing fee of ISS was suspended to lessen the expenses incurred during the registration of international students.

The highlight of this year is the "The 1st Investiture and Commissioning Rites for UPLB Ambassadors" one of the major events ISS conducted has been institutionalized. It is where the University commissioned sixteen (16) international students to become UPLB Ambassadors. The ambassadors came from the graduating class of 2013. This activity is in support to the internationalization efforts of the University and to encourage more international students to pursue their education here in the University.

ISS has been very supportive in their needs and actively participating in all the activities and programs for the international students. ISS maintains good relationship with the international community by building friendship and camaraderie, and by winning their trust and confidence.

YEAR-ROUND ACTIVITIES

LEARNING RESOURCE PROGRAM

The aim of the **Learning Resource Program (LRP)** is to provide students with learning assistance and enrichment activities in support of the instructional function of UPLB. There are two major activities undertaken by LRP to attain its objective: (1) The administration of the Summer Bridge Program (SBP) which is designed to assess and upgrade the college preparatory background of selected students and to further develop their social and study skills; (2) the administration of the Agricultural and Rural Development Scholarship (ARDS) Program which is designed to democratize access to UPLB education through a special procedure for the selection of scholars and the provision

The **Summer Bridge Program** (SBP) offered during summer was held on April 1-26, 2013. It is a 4-week intensive program in Mathematics and English, each bridge course is equivalent to a summer course with 48 class hours. Participants are given diagnostic exam for evaluation by the teacher, to gauge student capacity for Math and English. Out of more than 606 expected students, a total of 88 attended and finished the Summer Bridge Program. SBP participants are incoming freshmen who have formula scores equal to or below the prescribed scores in any or all in Reading, Language, and Mathematics. of academic, psychosocial, and financial support to its scholars.

SUMMER BRIDGE PROGRAM (SBP)



The **Agricultural and Rural Development Scholars (ARDS)** come from various regions in the country. During the 2nd Semester, AY 2012-2013, 50% came from Southern Luzon, 28.13% from Bicol and 2.9% from Central Luzon. However, in the 1st semester of 2013- 2014, 60% came from the Southern Luzon (Region IV), 32% from Bicol Region (Region V). The rest of the grantees about 4% are from the Central Luzon (Region III) and La Union (Region 1).

Among the 25 scholars enrolled in the 1^{st} semester, AY2013-2014, one (1) graduated, one (1) was a University Scholar, two (2) were College Scholars, five (5) were listed in the Honor Roll, and the rest have maintained good academic standing. Nine (9) new scholars were accepted this 2^{nd} Semester 2013-2014.

The Community Service – The ARDS scholars along with 60 Grade 2 students, rendered community service at Bernardo N. Calara Elementary School, Anos Los Baños, Laguna. The main objective of the service was to increase the consciousness and awareness of the scholars on how they can contribute to the development of the younger students. They are also required to join one immersion/affirmative action program of the Ugnayan ng Pahinungod.

The regional distribution of the bridge participants in summer show that 67.05 are mainly from the Southern Tagalog region. 12.5 from the Region III (Central Luzon), 6.82 comes from the Region II – (Cagayan Valley), 6.80 from the Region V – (Bicol), 3.41 from National Capitol Region and 1.14 from Region 1, Region VI and Region XI.



STUDENT DISCIPLINARY TRIBUNAL

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- 1. As a refresher and reminder to all the student organizations leaders and members, on June 6, 2013, the SDT invited Atty. Jacqueline de Guia, Chairman of the Human Rights Commission Region IV, to talk on the Human Rights violations in relations to the Anti-Hazing Law. All the provisions of the RA 8049 or the Anti-Hazing law were discussed by Atty. De Guia. This was participated in by 220 leaders and members of the different organizations.
- 2. Training was conducted by the SDT regarding the uniform implementation of the existing university student rules and regulations, on July 19, 2013 at the Makiling Ballroom. Specifically, the objective of this seminar is to guide the participants in the decision making and proper implementation of the University rules and regulations. Problems identified were resolved and recommendations to be submitted by the SDT to the proper authority for the amendments of some provisions in the student rules and regulations are in preparation. This seminar was participated in by the SDT Members, the parent jurors, student jurors and also a Legal Officer from the UPLB Legal Office. The different College Secretaries likewise attended the said training.
- 3. The Secretary/Coordinator of the SDT served as the resource person during the Parents' Orientation on May 2 to 11, and October 15, 2013. She discussed about the existing rules and regulations of the University and the services being offered by the SDT.
- 4. From November 2012 to December 2013, 75% of the new and pending cases were resolved by the Tribunal. Only 8 active cases or 25% remained in the SDT docket for resolution.
- 5. SDT was able to recruit three (3) new additional members of the pool of counsel. Among their duties is to serve as adviser/counsel to the student/respondent/s who has a pending case/s in the SDT. Likewise, they could serve as an adviser/guardian to a complainant or a respondent who is still a minor, in an SDT case.
- 6. In order to amicably settle the conflicts between two different groups (in SDT Cases 11-16, 12-03, 12-04, 12-06, and 12-11), the SDT member and the Coordinator of the SDT serves as mediator to the two (2) parties. As a result, their respective cases peacefully resolved and no longer pursued.
